



## Kids Rule: A Special Day at the Show

Kids Day at Kangaroo Valley Show is a cherished local tradition where school's out and the showground becomes a classroom without walls and a playground filled with adventure. This year introduces an exciting new guided program helping young visitors discover the Show's magic from dawn to dusk.

The morning starts with hands-on farm experiences - learning about dairy with cow milking and butter making, followed by engaging poultry demonstrations. Young bakers then roll up their sleeves in the baking workshop, creating treats to share at lunch, while budding poets prepare for their performances.

Throughout the day, children can explore the arena's thrilling horse shows, watch cattle judging, and marvel at local art and photography displays. A special "All About Bees" presentation adds to the day's discoveries, while Side Show Alley offers classic carnival fun. Frisbee golf and giant games provide active entertainment between events.

New for 2025, 'Dogs in the Park' in the paddock brings extra excitement with agility displays, breed meet-and-greets, and fun dog activities. The afternoon continues to buzz with My Little Pony rides, the Junior Talent Muster, and bicycle races. Children and their four-legged friends can join the Dog Show, compete for 'Fastest Dog' honors, and show off their pets. Traditional novelties like the Three-Legged Race, Thong Toss, Egg Toss, and Shoe Scramble bring laughs and friendly competition,

while the Fancy Dress parade showcases creative costumes.

Each young visitor receives their own Show passport with map and discovery trail, a member's badge, and a special canvas show bag - creating memories that last well beyond the closing Bush Dance.





# Kangaroo Valley Show Jumps into New Era

The Kangaroo Valley Show is entering an exciting chapter of renewal, guided by three dedicated horse stewards - Lorraine Mairinger OAM, Sharon Morris, and Deb Banks. Their combined expertise is revitalizing one of the region's most historic agricultural events.

"To truly be an agricultural show, you must have horses," reflects Lorraine, whose involvement spans over five decades since 1972. After navigating bushfires, COVID-19, and floods, the show's organizers recognized the need for strategic changes to attract competitors despite the Valley's challenging mountain access.

The response includes increased prize money for show jumping events and the groundbreaking introduction of Thoroughbred Sport Horse Association (TSHA) classes. "These young, healthy





athletic thoroughbreds have so much potential for a second career," explains Deb. The TSHA classes, sponsored by racing stables and breeding operations, offer valuable prizes to encourage the retraining of former racehorses.

Innovation extends to more accessible competition levels, with open classes starting from 45-60cm, lower than the typical 80-90cm entry point at other shows. This approach welcomes developing riders and horses while maintaining high standards through renowned course designer Kel Priestley's involvement.

"We're building on our heritage while creating new opportunities," says Sharon, highlighting the show's balance of tradition and progress. Alongside new initiatives, the show maintains its beloved traditional events including Child and Adult Riding classes, Pony and Hack classes, Mini's, Shetlands, Heavy Horse, and Show Hunter competitions. Children's fun events kick off the program on Friday afternoon.

With its combination of accessible entry points, serious competition, and pioneering support for thoroughbred rehabilitation, the revitalized Kangaroo Valley Show is positioning itself as a must-attend equestrian event that successfully embraces change while honoring tradition.









# **Broncs Join Bulls in Valley's Biggest-Ever Rodeo**


The Kangaroo Valley Show Rodeo is set to buck into action with a significantly expanded program for 2025, introducing events not seen previously on the Show Rodeo Events in the Shoalhaven & Southern Highlands area along with new prestigious awards that promise to make this year's event a landmark occasion.

In an exciting development, the program now includes Saddleback and Bareback Bronc riding, events that have long thrilled Queensland crowds but have been less common in NSW show Rodeo's. This expansion, alongside the established Shoalhaven Open Bull Championship, positions Kangaroo Valley at the forefront of rodeo's evolution in the state.

"Kangaroo Valley has always been a favourite for Rodeo riders of all ages," says Helen Mairinger, Chief Steward of the KV Show Rodeo and Secretary of the Nowra Rodeo Association. "There's something special about our country show atmosphere and the way spectators can see all the action, we have always been a show to support and encourage Junior riders, Adding these bronc riding events helps us build the sport and gives riders more opportunities to showcase their skills."

Riders in both categories must compete at all four Shoalhaven Shows - Berry, Nowra, Kangaroo Valley & Milton with The Championship events awarded at Milton Show Rodeo.

A highlight of the 2025 program is the introduction of the President's Choice award. This prestigious honour, including both a buckle and cash prize, will be awarded at the discretion of President Stephen Wilson to recognise outstanding




performance across either bull, steer and bronc riding categories.

The program also features a new Juvenile Champion Steer category open to riders aged 14-18, this category focuses on fostering young talent with a prestigious belt buckle.

Competitors are advised to register early through the ABCRA website, with entries strictly limited. Open Steer rides will accommodate approximately 16 spots, while other Steer Categories are capped at 12 participants. This structure ensures a high-quality competition while maintaining the event's traditional country show character.

Having grown up helping muster cattle in the early days of the Rodeo herself, Helen Mairinger brings a lifetime of local rodeo experience to her role. "Today's event combines professional organization with that authentic country atmosphere that makes Kangaroo Valley special," she reflects.

flowers and vegetables. Local artists and craftspeople display works that capture the essence of Valley life, while photographers share their unique perspectives through the lens.



# A Legacy of Cattle Excellence

The story of cattle in Kangaroo Valley mirrors the evolution of Australian agriculture. From 66 dairy farms in earlier times to today's five highly productive operations, the Valley's cattle industry exemplifies how innovation and tradition can thrive together.

"The best of the cows that you see in the Kangaroo Valley paddocks will be there, so come and have a closer look," invites Trevor Parrish, Chief Steward of Dairy Cattle and fourth-generation dairy farmer. His pioneering work in genetic breeding demonstrates the innovative spirit keeping dairy traditions alive.



Brad Hawthorne, Chief Steward of Beef Cattle, continues the legacy of his mentor David Kent. "It's an honour to have been passed the baton," reflects Brad, who, despite his city origins, found his calling in country life.

The Show's cattle events celebrate both dairy heritage and beef excellence, welcoming all European and British breeds. "A particular highlight is the Junior and Intermediate Parader competitions, which foster the next generation of cattle handlers under and over 15 years of age," Brad explains. The early-season timing makes it a crucial stepping stone for competitors gathering points toward the Royal Show, attracting strong participation from coastal and highland schools.

The Open Steer competition consistently draws the day's largest field, while the ECM competition provides valuable judge-exhibitor interaction. The section also reflects modern farming evolution, balancing traditional methods with growing interest in regenerative practices.

One tradition remains unchanged: rain, hail, or shine, farmers and their cattle gather at sunrise for a free sausage sizzle before competition begins. It's more than just a show – it's a celebration of agricultural heritage and the families who continue to shape it.


# THE ART OF SHOWING CATTLE: A FARMER'S PERSPECTIVE By Graeme Cochrane

In the show ring, cattle are evaluated on their overall conformation, including udder quality, body structure, feet and legs, and general style. Judges assess each animal's history, inquiring about calvings and age, as well as time since last calving.

The relationship between parader and cow is crucial for success. These 650kg animals can be headstrong on a halter, each possessing a unique personality that requires careful handling. A strong, trusting bond developed over years is essential, as a cow's misbehavior during a show can lead to disappointing results.

Our commitment to maintaining show cows in peak condition is a year-round endeavor. The transformation process begins 10-12 weeks before a show, demanding dedicated attention to detail. While receiving a ribbon is gratifying, the real reward lies in witnessing these magnificent animals develop through careful preparation. This dedication to excellence, combined with patience and respect, forms the foundation of successful cattle showing.

# A Heritage of Feathers

"The fascinating world of poultry breeding connects us to a tradition that spans millennia," reflects Rob Folkard, Poultry Chief Steward, as he describes how modern breeds trace their ancestry to Roman times. This rich heritage continues at the Kangaroo Valley Show, where poultry exhibition remains a cornerstone.

"Our Poultry Section truly offers something for everyone," Rob explains. "Whether you're an experienced breeder or simply appreciate these magnificent birds, you'll find something to capture your interest."

The two-day program begins Friday with a special exhibition of rare and unusual breeds. Saturday's main event showcases an impressive range of pure breeds, from diminutive Sebrights and **Dutch Bantams to majestic Cochins** and Brahmas. "The diversity we see in these birds is remarkable," notes Rob. "Each breed tells its own story of careful selection and breeding."

Qualified judges evaluate entries according to the Australian Poultry Standards across 135 classes, including fowls, waterfowl, turkeys, and geese. The competition also features six classes for backyard poultry and four egg classes in the John Walker Pavilion. Entry is free, with cards and prize money awarded to first and second place winners. Champions in each category compete for the prestigious "Champion and Reserve Champion Rare Breed" and "Champion and Reserve Bird of Show" titles.

Youth participation holds special importance. "Nurturing the next generation of poultry enthusiasts is crucial for preserving these breeds," Rob emphasizes. Competitors under 13 can enter both open classes and exclusive junior categories, which include ten purebred and six backyard classes, all with dedicated prize money.

The Poultry Pavilion promises an educational experience for all visitors, with a special session for kids on Friday. "What I love most," Rob shares, "is seeing people's faces light up when they discover the incredible variety and beauty of these birds. Many visitors leave with a newfound appreciation for poultry breeding."









## **KV's Dairy Excellence: From World Records to Artisan Awards**

"We were amateur cheesemakers who shared the joy of cheese making," recalls Kathy Harrington, speaking of herself and fellow enthusiasts Jan Watson and Rosie Johnson. When they discovered their local show lacked a dairy section, they approached the committee with the idea to start one, leading to the first cheese and dairy section in 2017.

The competition has flourished since, reaching 90 entries in 2024 and achieving a Guinness World Record in 2019 for the largest cheese tasting event. Categories now span from fresh butter and yoghurt to complex aged varieties like Parmesan and Stilton, showcasing the region's diverse dairy craftsmanship.

"Today there is no other local cheese

section anywhere south between KV and Bega," Kathy notes. "After 7 years, with covid setbacks aside, it is now a very popular section of the show with a healthy entry record. It's wonderful to see local people trying their hand at making a variety of cheese and dairy products. The open judging also attracts a lot of public interest."

This year's judge, Graham Redhead, brings extensive expertise to the event. With a background in Food Technology and international experience in Italy, France, and the UK, Graham founded Cheesemaking.com.au and pioneered 'Farmhouse Cheesemaking' courses. His anonymous judging provides valuable feedback to help participants enhance their craft.

# Inaugral 'Valley Shorts' Film Comp at Kangaroo Valley Show

The Kangaroo Valley Show 2025 is set to celebrate local creativity with the launch of the inaugural Valley Shorts Short Film Competition, a platform for aspiring filmmakers of all ages to share their stories. Designed especially for amateur filmmakers, but not precluding professionals past and present, this competition encourages participants to unleash their imagination using accessible tools—like smartphones and iPhones—to craft compelling short films between 30 seconds and 3 minutes long.

Valley Shorts is the creation of Julie Ward, founder of Your Life Stories and Executive Producer of entertainment television, who together with collaborator Gudula Dornseiffer aims to empower storytellers through accessible technology.



"With phones in hand, we are daily consumers and creators of short-form content," says Julie. "Valley Shorts is about taking those everyday skills and turning them into something special. You don't need expensive equipment—just a great idea and the desire to give it a go."

Open to filmmakers of all ages and abilities, Valley Shorts will acknowledge prizing for young filmmakers, juniors, and families, alongside awards for best lead character and the most creative use of a required element: a visual image of a heart, which must be cleverly incorporated into each submission.

The competition has received enthusiastic support from Shark Island Kangaroo Valley, recent producers of the acclaimed documentary \*The Pool\*. During the past year, Shark Island was seen filming around Kangaroo Valley for their upcoming documentary, currently titled \*The Valley\*, which is currently in post production.

"The medium of film and the power of storytelling can change lives and minds, and the smallest stories can have universal meaning," says Sarah Butler, Executive Director of Shark Island Kangaroo Valley. "We can't wait to see what the aspiring filmmakers of Kangaroo Valley produce."
